Below is a summary of what I reported to the congregation during my report at the Annual Meeting on January 27th.

In church today we heard Jesus quoting from Isaiah 61, giving the mission statement for his ministry, and I talked about how we are a part of furthering that mission. The question for us, the members of St. James, is how do we do this? How do we continue the work that Jesus started, take up the mantle in our own time, and equip this place so those who come behind us will have the resources to join in the work as well.

Paul's letter to the Corinthians helps us answer this question. He calls the church the body of Christ. Each of us, he says, is a different part, and each of us has different gifts; leadership, teaching, interpretation, prophecy and healing. He misses prayer, listening, writing, organizational skills, music and other arts, finance, courage to try new things... an endless list. But his point remains. Our role is to use our giftedness to work with one another, support one another, value those who are different, and without jealousy be about building up this church and God's mission in the world.

This is exactly what I see so many people at St. James doing. We are a community blessed with an abundance of gifts and I watch you using those gifts and resources to support our work. Rotating off of vestry alone, we have four incredibly talented and giving people:

Marty Bones, who is never afraid to tell you what she is thinking and to bring common sense to an issue in order to find a solution, and often helped shorten vestry debates.

Lauri Christianson, who in addition to sharing her musical abilities also shares a deep and thoughtful faith and a caring for the rest of the church community.

Daniel Righter who, despite his young age, has the ability to converse with almost anyone on almost any subject, to really listen, and to bring what he hears, so when he talks in meetings it isn't only from his own perspective, but with many others in mind.

John Everett, who brought a sense of humility and a sense of humor to his role as Sr. Warden these last two years, supporting many areas of the church, listening to your voices, taking on new projects, being willing to learn, but always thoughtfully contributing.

These four have been such an amaz-

ing gift to all of us over the last few years. I hope you will take the time to thank them for their service when you see them around. In addition, I want to name how a few others have served the body of Christ in often less noticed and honored ways, but in no less faithful ones.

Pete Kass has served as a volunteer and part of the SOS planning team for almost 30 years. He took on the unenviable task of finding, scheduling, and training volunteers to spend the night with the residents. This is always the hardest job to fill. In addition, he has been a welcoming face and helper as usher, week in and week out, at the 8:00 a.m. service. Pete doesn't look for accolades, but continues week by week and year by year to serve.

Jane Schmid may only be well known by people on altar guild. For decades now, every piece of fabric that touches the altar has been cleaned by Jane. Corporals, purificators, fair linens, all go to Jane's house

Three-Minute Theology

Heresies: Pelagianism

Orthodoxy, defined as right thought or belief, took a long time to develop in the early church. Over the first two hundred years the church was mostly bent on how to spread the good news of what Jesus had done, without trying to turn it into a formula. However, from time to time, people would teach things in the name of Christ that other Christians found incompatible with their faith. Over time, these teachings were condemned by the church as a whole, or at least a large majority of it, and labeled as heresies. Through these heresies, the church began to find the limits of the faith, the boundaries within in which one needed to believe in order to be truly Christian.

But these heresies did not go away. Many are very easy to fall into and end up becoming a part of our thinking even today. One of heresies that Christians fall into all the time is Pelagianism. Pelagius believed that no part of God's creation could be evil and that included both humanity and God's gift of free will. Therefore, he argued, we have the capability always of choosing what is right, that we can be justified on the basis of our merits. Our need for Jesus is not in order for his sacrifice to save us, but as an example of how to live a life that leads to salvation. We are in fact, according to Pelagius, able to achieve salvation by imitating the life of Christ. This viewpoint is considered heretical because of the way it limits Jesus. If what he did is obtainable for us it diminishes his divinity. It also raised humanity to a point of not really needing God at all.

While the church is clear that Pelagianism is heretical, and pretty much no one would claim to think they can earn their way into heaven, it is still easy for us to slip into thinking in this manner. Any time that we think we deserve a faster route to heaven or a larger room because of something we have done, we think that somehow we should get more on merit, instead of accepting that salvation comes through God's love for us. We see this in jokes that talk about earning our way into a book and in the judgment we sometimes make of others, instead of recognizing that we need God's love as much as they do.

If this happens to you from time to time, don't despair. When I took Church History in seminary, we were told that any paper without a heresy in it couldn't get an A, because we wouldn't really be putting ourselves into it. We, all of us, fall into heresies sometimes. This doesn't make you a bad Christian, it is part of working out our faith in a messy and broken world. Knowing what the church teaches can help us see earlier when we are making these mistakes and think about what a more faithful response might look like.

Connections and Compline


Every Sunday night at 9:00 p.m. via Zoom

On Epiphany, those present were asked to pick a "star word," a word for them to reflect on for the coming year. Didn't get yours? No worries, just let us know and we'll get one to you! You are invited to ponder what significance this word might have in your life, and how God might be speaking to you through this simple message. We used over 150 words, each with its own message and significance.

Allow this word to speak to you. A word that might seem unclear in the beginning might gain new understanding as the year goes on. We ask you to ponder what this "star word" might be telling you in the upcoming weeks and months? What is it showing you? Pointing you towards?

We'd love for you to share the discoveries of your star words with us as the year goes on. One blogger reflected on the star word she was given last year – peace. "So the word didn't mean what I thought it meant. It meant a great deal more. Was it more in a good way? I don't know, but I'm awake to see it." Another star word recipient wrote, "Often the words seem very timely, as if they were indeed designated for the recipient. It is this sense of serendipity and wondering how God might be working through this simple process that keeps people engaged."

One of our young people filling out college applications got the word 'intelligence', while one of our college students got the word 'planning'. What did it mean that one of our teachers got 'teaching' and one of our faithful choir members picked 'singing'? We can't wait to hear back from these folks! What are you finding your word to mean? Where is that star leading you?

Safe Church Training

In September of last year, the Diocese of Michigan passed a new policy called Safe Church: Creating a Healthy Environment for Children, Youth, and Vulnerable Adults. This policy comes from our deep love and caring for all people, and an awareness that churches have not always been a safe place for everyone. In order to do this, we need to pay special attention to children, youth and vulnerable adults. The goal of the new policy is to keep all people, and these especially, free from sexual abuse, physical abuse, personal abuse, and exploitation.

A part of this policy is to train people throughout churches in the diocese. The training comes in two levels, Universal and Specialized, depending on the responsibilities and ministries of the individuals. The goal is to have an understanding of both how to keep people safe and what to look for if abuse is suspected. Guidelines on whether you should take a training and which training you should take are below. No one needs to take both trainings. The initial training will be in person, with the possibility that online updates are being explored. As we understand it now, if you were trained in a face to face class under the former policy, you are covered until three years after your last training.

St. James is currently planning to schedule at the very least a Universal Training in the near future. Specialized trainings are already scheduled in multiple churches near us over the next few months (with Pastor Chris as one of the facilitators at the upcoming February 9 and March 9 classes), and you can register for them at <http://www.edomi.org/whitaker/programs/safe-church/>. You can also contact the church with questions or to have us sign you up.

You should take Specialized Training if:

- You are a church employee of any kind or clergy
- You are a Vestry member, Eucharistic Visitor, or involved with any of our children or youth programs
- You supervise or have oversight over children, youth, Eucharistic Ministers or Visitors

You should take Universal Training if:

- You have key access to the church and are not one of the above
- You are a Eucharistic Minister and are not one of the above

where it is spotted, laundered, and ironed so it can be lovingly placed on the altar, and get wine spilled on it all over again. She works as far behind the scenes as possible, and faithfully has cared for God's house year in and year out.

And finally, I am announcing that the day we all feared has come: Peggy John is planning to retire this summer. Peggy has brought her financial acumen to this church and served it faithfully for years, but this is a small part of what we will miss. Peggy remembers our history and knows where people are now living. Peggy is the one former members call when they want to be in touch. Peggy also opens the church up for the 7am Wednesday service and the Saturday knitters, and more importantly, creates a hospitable environment by putting the coffee on. I am already in discussions with her about which of these things she does as her job and which she will continue to do as a member of the church. I fully expect there to be a formal way to celebrate her service and thank her near the end of the program year.

These people, and so many more of you, know what it means to be a part of the body of Christ. We are a deeply gifted congregation and your generosity in sharing your gifts is a deep blessing to all who enter this place. None of these blessings, however, exempt us from having to live in the world as it is today. Attendance at churches around the country is significantly down, and if you measure by size and budget, we are not the church we once were. Unlike many churches around us, and thanks to the generosity of our members, we have stayed about even in terms of attendance and finances the last few years, despite the number of members we have lost.

The vestry will be spending time this winter working on a vision

for the future of St. James. A few things we already know. Our 2019 budget is not a good one. While we think we can beat that budget we will continue an unsustainable trend this year. Having said that, in all of our long term budgeting forecasts, we expect this to be the worst year. The changes that have been or will be put into effect will start to show dividends in 2020. I am continuously grateful to the Parish Fund and the many faithful members who funded it over the years for giving us the space to more gently make changes and not do harm to our program or members. It is the vestry's full intention to find that place where we are able to use our resources to faithfully follow God, while at the same time responsibly caring for what has been left us so future generations at St. James will be able to benefit from them as well.

Preparing for the future brings me to another thing we fully expect to happen this year. Our building has significant areas that need work in ways both seen and unseen. The Property Committee is, right now, getting quotes for some of these and we fully expect to launch a Capital Campaign in the near future. The goal of this campaign will be to pay for major repairs and improvements over the next few years. For more about what we need, please feel free to see me or a property or vestry member. Expect a lot more information about all of this soon.

We have needs and we have challenges that will have to be met this year, but we are also surrounded by amazing, faithful people. On our staff and in our pews are people with great ideas, a willingness to work hard, and a deep generosity that I am confident will lead us into an amazing future.

You are the church, not our building or program, and St. James Church is incredibly strong. Day by day we will continue to spread God's

love, to care for one another, and to serve the world in God's name. I am deeply grateful to be a part of you and to witness all you are doing. Please continue to pray, continue to love one another, and to work together to be God's people in the world.
