In September of 1993, St. James hired one of her own as financial secretary. Peggy John, who was confirmed here when Ken Gass was Rector, brought her considerable skills to help us keep all of our finances in order, and has done so and more for over 25 years now. She has put up with seven different priests with different ideas about spending and reporting. She has created reports for more than 300 vestry meetings, helped us pass 25 audits, and reported to 25 Annual Meetings. She has made sure that 6 church and nearly 20 preschool employees get paid on time and that all the right amounts go to the IRS. She has also made sure that bills get paid so we always have light, water, and heat in our building.

As Financial Secretary, this was her job. Tracking carefully the money that comes in and out of the church is important to assisting our ministry. It is Peggy who has made sure that funds are assigned to the correct accounts, and ready to spend when Altar Guild needs a new fair linen or the J2A class is headed out on pilgrimage. It is Peggy who collects your donations, keeps track of what was given towards your pledge and what went to support relief efforts after a weather disaster, gets the money to the right places, and makes sure the full amount is on your statement. She has done this through changes to our software, many new procedures from the church and auditors, learning to accept stocks as gifts and dealing with giving over the internet.

In addition to the specifics of her job description, Peggy has been part



of the team that is our church staff. Working with many different people, she has always looked to support what is going on around her. She is also the presence of institutional memory in staff meetings and the church at large. If you want to know where former parishioners have moved, or who their children were, Peggy is the one to ask. She also has a remarkable ability to go into the Archives and pull out the very thing we need that would have taken the rest of us hours to find.

More important than all of this is Peggy's compassion, her desire to know and support her fellow parishioners, and the way she takes care of so many different people. She goes on pastoral visits, sometimes using her job as an excuse. She reaches out to people she hasn't seen for a while in order to make sure they are well. There is a reason why she is the first one people call with questions about something happening at the church. Members also call in order to keep her updated on what is happening in their lives or their children's because they know how much she cares, and they enjoy the chance to catch up.

After almost 26 years of sharing these many gifts with us, Peggy John is

Three-Minute Theology

The Liturgical Year

June 9 is the Feast of Pentecost followed the next week by Trinity Sunday. I have received a lot of questions about why these are in mid-June this year instead of May as often happens. In order to answer this well, a quick review of the liturgical year is in order. The church year actually begins in either November or December. This is because we always start with the season of Advent, which is the four Sunday's before Christmas. During Advent we wait in hope and prepare for Jesus' coming into the world. The color therefore can be blue, which symbolizes hope, or purple, which symbolizes preparation.

Christmas is, of course, always on December 25th, and its color is white for celebration. The Christmas season lasts 12 days, so the Feast of Epiphany is always on January 6. The season following Epiphany focuses on how God is revealed to the world, and the color is green for growing. The length of Epiphany is variable from year to year, depending on the date of Easter. Easter or the Feast of the Resurrection, is not on a set date because it is tied to cycles of both sun and moon. The date of Easter each year is on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox. Therefore, it can move from as early as March 23 to as late as April 25. Because the season after Epiphany ends on Ash Wednesday, and Ash Wednesday is always 40 days before Easter, it can end anywhere from early February to mid-March.

Ash Wednesday ushers in the season of Lent which is 40 days (not including Sundays). Its color is purple for preparation. Easter season then lasts 50 days, sometimes called the great 50 days, and we again use white for celebration. On the 40th day we celebrate the Ascension, and the conclusion of Easter is the Feast of Pentecost, which is red for the Holy Spirit. The week after Pentecost is known as Trinity Sunday and it is the moment we celebrate the fullness of God as revealed to us. After Trinity, we begin what is sometimes called Normal Time, because we have caught up in the story to our present, or Ordinary Time, because we are counting the Sundays after Pentecost. It is also sometimes called the season after Pentecost. The Sundays are numbered by the Propers assigned for each week in the lectionary. Because this final season starts at different times, we choose our lessons each week based on the date, so we can end with Proper 29 before Advent of next year. Proper 29 is often called Christ the King Sunday, and it points us to the kingdom to come. Instead of counting from Pentecost, therefore, the first week of this time will be Sunday, June 23, which is called Proper 8 or the Sunday closest to June 22. This variation allows us to make the appropriate adjustments to balance with the season after Epiphany.

If all of this is confusing to you, you aren't alone. The good news in these days of computers is you can go anytime to the excellent website lectionarypage.net. This website allows you to look at the whole year, check on when different holidays are, and click on links for any given day to see the collect of the day and the lessons. As always, if there are any questions, I am happy to help.

Pentecost, June 9—Those who can read languages needed

Pentecost, a major feast day in the church, is one of the only times during the liturgical year when we use the color red, the color of the Holy Spirit. Traditionally, congregants also wear red on this day as we celebrate the gift of God's Spirit to the church, a moment we sometimes think of as the church's birthday. Our tradition at St. James is to read in different languages on this day, to celebrate the disciples being understood by people of many tongues. If you can read a language besides English, Fr. Josh could use your help. We have been blessed with many great gifts from our parishioners in the past and would love to include you. Please contact him by Wednesday, June 5 for instructions.

What will you hear? A cello, viola, piano, accordion? A djembe player? I won’t tell you: come to church this summer to find out. Perhaps you have always wanted to offer a song or to play an instrumental piece in church. This is



your chance; please let me know of these secret aspirations.

We’re also looking for new handbell ringers to join us this fall. We rehearse on Monday evenings, 6:30-8 p.m., and play on Sundays approximately once a month. No previous experience is necessary, and you don’t need to read music—we’ll teach you everything you need to know, and even some things you don’t need to know, believe me.


